Railway and building work

After a successful return by the Thursday afternoon group, the second lockdown has forced a stop to our activities although there has been a small force doing odd jobs around the Nursery. Before the lockdown we managed to finish the toilet block as is reported elsewhere in this issue. On the railway front a plan for refurbishment/restoration to our trucks. This involves building a brake van, temporary replacement of the skip in the car park for refurbishment — a new chassis will be overhauled to replace the skip. Terry Stanhope has had the seals on it's gearbox replaced and reinstalled and is now a runner.

Although not being done by the Thursday group, we have helped in the refurbishment of the S5 the Knottingley Shed to turn it into a woodworking room. This will involve a new electrical supply and building of cupboards etc.

Railway traffic

Over three weekends November 22, 28/9 and December 5/6 there will be an upgrade a £9.8m to the railway between Poppleton and Knaresborough to improve reliability and capacity. The scheme is funded by North Yorkshire County Council and the York and North Yorkshire Local Enterprise Partnership and undertaken by Network Rail. The signalling will be upgraded to eliminate token working (see Potting Shed 56 for an explanation) and replace with axle counting. The up semaphore home signal has been replaced by a more modern and lessglamorous colour light signal, as shown at the end of this issue.

At Cattal the speed limit will be increased which will enable two trains to arrive simultaneously. If you are thinking of travelling by train between York and Harrogate on the above dates, you are advised to check National Rail enquiries.

Ward Grant Application

We have submitted an application for funding to York Council's Rural West Ward Grant Scheme for 2020–21.

It includes some new wheelbarrows and replacement tables, as well as a noticeboard for the entrance. Also included is a PC projector and laptop. These will be very useful for explaining the history of the nursery and its current role to both visitors and new volunteers, as well as company and community groups.

This application was followed with a visit to the nursery by Councillor James Barker and we are considering his suggestion of holding a community event next year.

Poppleton station adoption

Regular Wednesday afternoon sessions have made steady progress with tidying up the flowerbeds and planting new flowers and shrubs. The flowerbeds now look very much more presentable compared with the state they were in at the end of the lockdown period in June. New bushes have been planted in the three empty concrete tubs on the York platform.

We are grateful to Northern for sanctioning our bid for £300 to support station activities and our membership of Community Rail Network has been renewed.

We are starting to think about developments for next year but, in the meantime, intend continuing with the Wednesday afternoon sessions to keep everything under control.

The engineering works mentioned elsewhere in this issue sees the replacement of Poppleton's up home semaphore signal by a more modern colour light signal nearer the A59 bridge. These rapidly disappearing oases of semaphore signals give character to the railway where they are found. Below is a photo remembrance of the signal. The right photo,

taken by Richard Foster, shows the signal arm being removed. The lower middle shows, on the left hand side, the semaphore's electric and smaller replacement. At the time of writing the post is still extant, but there are still two weekends of engineering works to come...
