Railway and building work

The re-roofing of S10 is now finished and we have started on the re-roofing of the Potting Shed. This is proving to be a longer job than S10 as we have had to replace rotten wood before replacing the roofing.

On the railway we have made a start on painting numbers on our railway vehicles, if anybody has a talent as a sign writer and would be prepared to come in and finish the numbering job let us know. LoweCo is still not running although we have various leads to follow. Over the next two weeks track maintenance will be carried out as we are having a visit from the Narrow Gauge Society on 14 July. Several of the Thursday team had a chance to meet the NGS a couple of weeks ago at a visit to Neil Clayton's narrow gauge railway in Ripon.

There has been some tentative progress on making a possible push trolley which will have removable seating.

Gardening News

The plant production side of the Nursery has been in overdrive for the past few

months. Seeds have been sown, seedlings transplanted, plug plants potted on and cuttings taken. Now there are hundreds of bedding plants for your garden, not to mention perennials and a good selection of herbs.

Vegetable plants have proved popular (we still have some) and include sweet corn, pumpkins, leeks cabbages and of course various varieties of tomatoes.

As in previous years, people have bought their hanging baskets to be refilled, so our "specialist team" have been kept very busy. They have produced a number of baskets for the Nursery as well not to mention 24 for the Embsay and Bolton Abbey Steam Railway.

Those who haven't visited us for some time will find that the Shop area has changed tremendously. Benches for many of the plants have just been finished courtesy of the Monday pm Group, and other areas for the remaining plants have been changed out of all recognition.

Many more people are getting to know about the Nursery, particularly from Bob Brook's talks to various gardening clubs and the advert in the Community Centre newsletter. We have a faithful, hard working group of regular volunteers but we are always grateful for more pairs of hands. As well as the work, we have a great deal of fun. Do come and join us, you will be made very welcome.

Poppleton station flowers



As you probably know for the last 6 years the Nursery has been responsible for the planting and upkeep of the flower beds and pots on the station. Ways to Wellbeing (Social Prescribing)

This is a new initiative, funded by York Council, which is being piloted by the Priory Medical Group. The Group has a number of GP surgeries across York.

Instead of prescribing medication etc. GPs can refer anyone registered with them for alternative activities and services, including volunteering and skills development. Referrals are made to the Coordinator at the York Centre for Voluntary Service (York CVS), who interviews the person and helps direct them to the most suitable activity or service.

Graham Collett met with Jasmine Howard, the Coordinator, recently and drew her attention to what the nursery can offer. She already has one person in mind who might benefit from joining us as a volunteer.

If the pilot is successful, it is hoped to extend it across York.

The nursery company annual general meeting will be held on Wednesday 5 October at 2.00pm at the nursery. Please put the date in your diary.



The above photo, which we obtained from the Poppleton History Society has intrigued us for some time. We have found further information from the book Voices from the Railways edited by Julian Holland and published by the AA in 2013. In a piece from that book entitled The Young Entrepreneurs of Poppleton, Dick Smith details how in 1960 with several of his friends he started 'Poppleton General Transport' and built several carts on old pram chassis. These were used to transport railway passengers' luggage from Poppleton station. A fare was not charged but users were asked to give a contribution to a children's charity. A special 'low loader' with 3" wooden side members was also built to transport peat from the Gardens' Guild store. The charity's magazine featured the lads complete with the above photograph. Dick can't remember how much money was raised but he says they never had anything but kind support. As he says in the book this sort of thing would not be allowed today on health and safety and insurance grounds.
